## Reflections on Jesus for Holy Week 2024

Without a doubt, there is no time in the history of the world that is deserving of our focus and attention than the biblical and historical account of the arrest, trial, crucifixion, and resurrection of our Lord and savior Jesus Christ.

Unfortunately, there is not enough time to deliver the details of facts regarding the conspiracy between political officials, religious leaders, Jewish authorities, and other magistrates to bring a totally innocent man to trial and conviction in the middle of the night to be crucified – the most horrific manner of torturous death known to mankind.

This week of Bible study reflections should bring an awareness to the things that we have called social injustice, inequity, racial prejudice, violation of human rights, and a plethora of other violations that were endured by Jesus who never declared His innocence, offered no defense, and never responded or pleaded innocence. 8. What do you think was Pilate's motive to give away the body of Jesus to Joseph?

4. What does Jesus' lack of response to the question "where are You from?" reveal to you about His encounter with Pilate?
5. What does Jesus' challenge to Pilate regarding his authority over Him affect his decision to try to free Him?
6. What do you think Pilate meant when he said "Behold Your King"?
7. Why do you believe Pilate did not change the writing on the cross that proclaimed Jesus to be the king of the Jews?
8. What example can you gain from Jesus Making provision for the care of His mother after His death?

4. What do you believe was in the heart of Judas when he tried to kiss Jesus?
5. Why was Jesus' exposure Judas' motives important to be revealed?
6. What do you believe Jesus was meaning when He asked "permit even this"?
7. What do you believe Jesus was showing when He healed the ear of the servant of the high priest?
8. What is the meaning of Jesus' statement "This is your hour and the power of Darkness"?

**Tuesday, March 26, 2024**

Questions:

1. How do you believe Caiaphas the high priest, the scribes and the elders were able to be assembled in the late hours of the day?
2. What do you believe kept the scribes and elders from finding evidence against Jesus?
3. How did Jesus ward off the false testimony of those who were coming against Him?
4. What was Jesus saying when He said, “I am able to destroy the temple of God in three days and rebuild it in three days”?
5. Why do you suppose Jesus kept silent when words of accusation were spoken against Him?
6. Why did Jesus refuse to answer the question as to whether or not He was Christ directly?
7. What is your understanding of the word “blasphemy”?
8. What was the basis of the decision of those who were interrogating Jesus that caused them to believe He was worthy of death?

**Wednesday, March 27, 2024**

Read: **Jesus Faces Pilate**

**Taking the Place of Barabbas**

Questions:

1. Why did they make the decision to send Jesus before Pilate?
2. What do you believe was the motive of gathering all of these officials in the middle of the night for this trial that had no formal charges?
3. What might have been Pilate's motive for asking, “are you king of the Jews”?
4. What does Jesus' decision not to answer the question tell you about Him?
5. What do you believe was Pilate's motive to ask the crowd about releasing Jesus or Barabbas?
6. Do you believe in the sincerity of Pilate's statement questioning what has Jesus done that He should suffer crucifixion?
7. Why do you believe Pilate's unanswered question “what has He done?” was left unanswered?
8. What do you believe was Pilate's scourging of Jesus before he delivered Him over to the crowd?
